Precision Livestock Farming - Developments and Trends

A summary of the 6th European Conference on Precision Livestock Farming 2013

The development and use of Precision Livestock Farming (PLF) is growing rapidly as a result of economic, environmental, health and welfare pressures. Precision Livestock Farming aims to assist with new tools and equipment as well as software systems for livestock monitoring and management to overcome these challenges.

The 6th European Conference on Precision Livestock Farming (ECPLF), which was held in Leuven, Belgium from the 10-12th of September 2013 was combined with the final conference and workshop of several ongoing EU projects: the BioBusiness project, the ALL-Smart-Pigs project and the EU-PLF project, all focused on development of Precision Livestock Farming (PLF). Major topics included cattle (primarily dairy), pigs, poultry, horses, sheep and goats, aquaculture and environmental impacts of livestock farming. The aim of this conference was to contribute to knowledge exchange through productive discussions to progress PLF, specifically combining technology and biological sciences.
